<u>Walthamstow West Community Council – Spend Options.</u>

At the Walthamstow West Community Council meeting on 7 November 2005 residents participated in workshops and then voted to prioritise the top three themes to spend the Community Council annual budget of £10,000. The top three themes were: Youth, Anti Social Behaviour measures and equipment in parks. The Community Chair requested that the suggestions mentioned by residents and other initiatives related within these themes be investigated for feasibility with costs ready for final voting and decision at the next Community Council meeting on 16 January 2006.

		They have a mobile youth venue (camper van), which is regularly seen around Waltham Forest and offers a safe place for young people to hang out and to receive advice on a range of issues facing young people in the 21st Century. They have detached youth workers currently engaging young people in the Priory Court Estate area (William Morris ward) and would welcome funds from the Community Council to continue and build on this work by deploying the Mobile Youth Club to this area. (Their current funding streams are coming to an end). Quote taken from a young person referring to Worth Unlimited posted on a web message board: "I've heard about some of the work that your volunteers have been doing, and I've seen some of it in Priory Court and Boundary Rd, and I am proud to say that there is a group trying to help the community. I have been so inspired that I have applied to attend university and study youth and community work and maybe try to make a difference like your charity."	for 28 sessions	
Youth	8. Continue schools environmental project	Response Community Council Officer: In September 2004 the Community Council agreed £2000 to sponsor an environmental project at local schools. All the schools within the community council area were contacted and eight schools agreed to take part and each received £250.00. The schools mainly spent the money in improving the environment around their school area, by buying bulbs, plants, seeds, vegetables, pots, tools and pond liner. Two schools earmarked the money for a recycling project and litter awareness.	£2000	Yes

		Schools could be contacted again if the Community Council wishes to see if they wish to take part in another environmental project.		
Anti Social Behaviour Measures	9. Street Crime Warden Patrols	Response: Sian Hasler Partnerships and Operations Manager, Community Safety. Street crime wardens are already working in some of the Community Council areas. However, extra warden cover for specific areas at specific times can be employed to patrol key areas with the purpose to engage with youth with a view of reducing anti social behaviour. Street Wardens engage / reassure young people but have no enforcement powers. Cost is approximately £15 per hour. For 2 street wardens patrolling 4 hours, 5 evenings a week for 4 weeks the cost would be £2500.	£2400	Yes
Anti Social Behaviour Measures	10. Operation "payback"	Response Elaine Smith Probation Service: This is an initiative in partnership with the probation service. Its aim is to enable offenders subject to Community Punishment/Unpaid Work Orders to make amends to local communities. Each project is elected to reduce crime and offenders are risk assessed as to their suitability to take part. A London Probation Placement Manager will risk assess all project sites and the offenders are supervised at all times by an employee of the Probation Service. The objectives of the project are as follows: Reduction in fear of crime,	£5000 would pay for 40 days work.	Yes
		Increase community confidence in local service provision, Reduce the visibility of signal crimes, Reduction in re-offending by those taking party in the scheme, Address priority area identified by local communities. Examples of work being undertaken would be clearance of vegetation/bushes in high crime areas to increase visibility and feeling of safety, litter clearance, painting out graffiti. A wide variety		

		of work can be undertaken and as the scheme evolves the projects will become more diverse. Funding has been provided to purchase a vehicle and equipment. The Community Council would pay for the supervisor salary and therefore buy days and identify areas, which they wanted cleaned and tidied within the Community Council area. Leyton and Whipps Cross Community Council have recently allocated £5000 to this project and are now identifying areas to target.		
Anti Social Behaviour Measures	11. Police High Visibility Patrols	Response: Sian Hasler Partnerships and Operations Manager, Community Safety. The Police working overtime will try to hotspot the vulnerable areas in respect of youth crime, anti social behaviour and put extra patrols within the 4 wards that the Community Council covers. Once the amount of spend has been decided we can work out how best to put resources in place. Cost is £30 an hour. A costing of £4000 will pay for four police officers working overtime for 4 hours twice a week. Two officers working would extend this to eight weeks.	£4000	Yes
